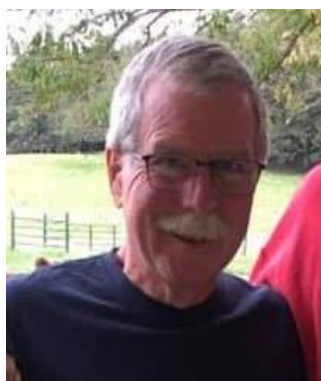

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The Pastor's Perspective ...

Those of us who enjoy the absolute pleasure of living in New England know that we have a number of “seasons” that we experience above and beyond Winter, Spring, Summer and Fall. Some of those sub-seasons occur on the threshold between Winter and Spring. Those sub-seasons are ice season, mud season, and then black fly season. The backyard of the parsonage is currently experiencing mud season. Mud season is less dangerous than ice season and much less annoying than black fly season. Mud season is especially fun when you have multiple dogs in the house.



Similar to ice season, during mud season one has to carefully consider where they place their feet. We do not stroll casually or carelessly through the world. We look for firm footing ... grassy spots, perhaps even snowy or icy spots that will allow us to remain above the muddy and mucky mire. I usually walk slower during mud season than I do during ice season. I am typically pretty sure and steady on the ice, and it is generally a pretty safe bet that I will not splash ice on my pants or track it into the house.

As I looked at the muddy footprints left behind by Tuffy on the foyer floor, I briefly grumbled to myself about the season. But then I considered the possibility of mud season being a good metaphor for the season of Lent.

We are not intended to race quickly through Lent. It is not a sprint. Lent is a season of reflection as we make our way to Jerusalem, Golgotha, and the cross with Jesus. The walk is slow and steady. We pause along the way to contemplate our journey and what it means to our faith lives.

I am certain that there are those who stride confidently through Lent, observing the steady ground of repeated spiritual practices. However, just like the slate pavers in the walkway, mud can make them shift as well. Our lives get muddy. Circumstances arise that change our experiences of the world. We grow and we struggle in our faith.

My goal for mud season this year is to change my perspective. Rather than see it as a source of complaint and consternation, I will accept it as a challenge ... an opportunity to chart a new course each time I venture into the yard.

Likewise, my goal for Lent is to walk slowly and steadily, contemplating each step along the way. I will seek new and meaningful ways to experience the Lenten discipline.

Lent is more than the forty shopping days that lead up to our Easter celebrations. It is an opportunity to deepen our faith and our relationships with Jesus Christ.

Yes, life is mucky and muddy at times. But the mud is also the sign that the earth is thawing from the winter freeze, and new life will once again spring forth. May God bless you on your Lenten walk. May this time bring you new life in Jesus Christ.

Thank you to all who supported our Super Bowl fundraiser.

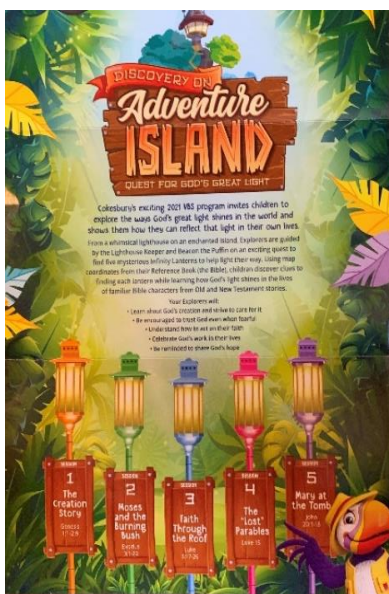

As organist, he has performed with the Portland Symphony Orchestra, ChoralArt, Oratorio Chorale, the USM Chamber Singers, and many others in addition to solo recitals all across the East Coast



and Canada. He regularly performs on harpsichord with St. Mary's Schola and is a founding member of the *Sul Cappello Ensemble*. As a conductor, he has directed many workshops and conducted numerous choirs over the past fifteen years. Currently, he is the artistic director and a founding member of *Dirigo Ensemble*, an elite *a cappella* ensemble of and for Maine. Chris is also the conductor of the Cathedral Consort, a board member for the Friends of the Kotzschmar Organ, and Past-Dean of the Portland Chapter of the American Guild of Organists.

Chris holds a bachelor's degree from McGill University in Organ and a Masters degree from the University of Southern Maine in Choral Conducting. While at the University of Southern Maine, Chris developed a particular interest in the pedagogy of music education and continues to research methods of musical instruction.

His organ pedigree includes Michael Joseph, Dr. John Grew, Dr. Hans-Ola Ericcson, and Dr. William Porter. His harpsichord and early music passion were born from Hank Knox, Vallerie Kinslow, and Dr. Lena Weiman Ericcson. As a baritone, he owes much to Bruce Fithian and Scott Wheatly for their immeasurable coaching and support. Outside of music, Chris enjoys home building projects, woodworking, hiking, swimming, and listening to audiobooks.

History of First Parish Meal Ministry

After the new building was completed and we had “moved in” Lynn Johnson got a group of parishioners together in 2006 to see what we could do to make use of the fantastic industrial kitchen that we now had. From there we started finding our way with meals we could provide to the community.

Lynn, along with Dick and Jackie Lavoie lead the charge and we started with spaghetti suppers. Those were ok for a while, but as one patron mentioned “anyone can cook a spaghetti supper at home”. That was a clue that we were not on the right path yet. One summer we tried BBQ Chicken dinners. Again, they worked for that time but was not where we were supposed to be. Dick and Jackie suggested having an old-fashioned New England Bean Suppah. We tried that and found this was the path we should be on.

We held these suppahs February through June and September through November in the beginning. At some point we decided to hold these suppahs during the summer as well. We found that folks “from away” were searching for something New England while they were visiting. These suppahs have been amazing. We have had visitors from all over the country come in and enjoy food and fellowship as only First Parish can provide.

Dick and Jackie have since moved on and Sue Burgess stepped in, or was hornswoggled, to lead the team. We now provide monthly Bean Suppahs from February through November on the second Saturday of each month. We have our regulars, who we have grown very fond of, attend each month and we catch up with each of them. First Parish fellowship shines brightly at each of these meals. “We enter as strangers and leave as friends.”

We sold lobster roll lunches once. Those require a lot of pre-work and can be expensive. The folks who did purchase a lunch were incredibly pleased with what was provided.

We provided the food for the reception that was given to Rev. Doug Nielsen upon his retirement.

We provide a reception with finger foods for the annual ChIME (Chaplaincy Institute of Maine) commencement. This is an incredible event where we witness the joy of blessed individuals who go on to their calling. Depending on the number of graduates we have served a variety of number of people at any one event.

At the 2019 Annual Meeting of the Maine Conference that was held at First Parish we provided lunches and a dinner for the attendees. This was a large undertaking and was well received by all who attended.
