
### Winter Book Retreat Ten Evenings With God, by Ilia Delio



# The Season of Lent



## Pastor Scott's Message...

### The Pastor's Perspective ...



We began the season of Lent with our Ash Wednesday service of worship. We had nearly fifty people attend. To be honest, that is the largest Ash Wednesday service that I have led in all the years of my ministry. When I got home that evening, I spent a few minutes on social media as I sipped my coffee. I saw some posts from people asking why some churches were observing Ash Wednesday because it is a "Catholic" thing. In the past, I have also had people tell me that the season of Lent is really more of a "Catholic" observance. It got me to thinking ... why are they perceived to be a season and a service primarily observed by one particular faith tradition?

Admittedly, I do not have any answers to the question, and I am not going to do a deep dive into the internet searching for related articles or journal entries. Instead, I will tiptoe down the path of speculation. Care to join me?

I wonder if the perception is based upon the way that many people view the season of Lent. We often hear people talk about giving up this or that for Lent. People give up chocolate, or dessert, or coffee, or television. Some people change their diets, fasting during Lent or giving up meat on Fridays. Having said that, there are those who talk about adding some sort of discipline or practice during this season or seeking to perform acts of kindness during Lent.

Some view Lent as a season of deprivation. There are churches that remove all of the decorations from their sanctuary, and others that do not celebrate communion. And there are others that walk through this season dedicating themselves to making positive choices in the things that they say and do.

As I drove home for lunch this afternoon, I contemplated what it would mean to make Lent a season of joy. Yes ... we know that we are journeying to Jerusalem with Jesus as he prepares for his crucifixion, but we know that horrific event is followed by Easter joy. What if we were to spend Lent preparing for Easter joy rather than the death on the cross. During the first couple of days of Lent, I have shared reflections about seeing the season as a time to encounter God in new ways. What is more joyful than walking hand in hand, heart in heart with God?! What is more joyful than listening for God's Voice and hearing God call you "Beloved"?

Let us not give Lent away. Let us not say, "Well, that is for someone else. That is their observance." May we look forward to this special time that we can spend with God. May we look forward to the loving and intimate conversations that we can share. May we journey with joy as we develop an ever-deepening appreciation for that sacred Easter morning. Reminder ... I hope that you will plan to join me for lunch on Sunday, March 19, following the 10:00 AM worship service. I am looking forward to these fellowship opportunities at which we can deepen our relationships by sharing your stories.

I wanted to thank everyone for returning their pledge card and prayerfully considering their contribution. Several of us reviewed the membership rolls after phone conversations to those we haven't seen or heard from recently. We pay a membership to the UCC Conference for each member so we wanted to have an accurate count of active members.

An important financial note is that our electric and propane bills have exponentially escalated. As a result, we are asking individuals responsible for the use of the building to keep the lights off especially in the Sanctuary and the Atrium. The small spotlights in the Atrium have been converted to LEDs, but the mercury vapor lights near the ceiling need fixture replacement which is expensive, due to their location (height) and cost of the new fixtures. Thank you for your consideration!

We are lucky so far that the lack of snowstorms has meant that our snow removal budget has not been hit hard!!

We have many PL alumni in our church family so if you have any questions, please ask. There are camping opportunities for ALL ages.


The Christian Education team is focused on helping everyone, regardless of age, to have the opportunity to attend Pilgrim Lodge. We will have camperships available to all who want to go.

This new article in "The Messenger" will focus on our different teams and groups here at First Parish. We hope this will bring more understanding to you and provide information as to what each team does, when they meet and the current members of the team. Perhaps it may pique your interest enough to join a team and help First Parish keep the light shining for all to see.



### **Women's Fellowship**

**When did the Women's Fellowship group officially start?** In the year 1909! At that time, the title of our group was "The Madisses", which represented the *madams* and *misses* of the congregation.

**Who are the members?** **All** the women of the church belong to this group. Glen Ellen Roth is the chair. Maureen O'Donnell has been the vice-chair, and Carol Spencer-Lemay has been the secretary. Sue Neumyer was not the chair of the fair(!), but was in charge of advertising the church fair.

**When does this group meet?** Women meet Tuesday mornings in Fellowship Hall starting at about 9:30 am to talk, or knit, or sew, or drink some coffee. We usually end at about 11:00 AM.

**What is the purpose of this group?** We have many roles! Our biggest emphasis is on loving one another and learning about each other in order to strengthen the community of God. Although we stopped meeting during COVID, we hope to start resuming fellowship brunches or lunches at a time when all may attend. We give back to our church and the community in many ways, which will be outlined below. We organize (at minimum) one large fundraiser per year on the first Saturday of December, which is the Church's Gingerbread Fair. We are usually involved in hosting the receptions after a funeral.

**How does Women's Fellowship Support the Church financially?** We pledge income to the church every year. In addition (this past year alone), we paid for the new refrigerator for the kitchen and bought an air hockey game for the Youth Room. We provide the coffee for Coffee Hour. (Women's Fellowship likes to supply whatever equipment or supplies may be needed for the kitchen or funerals.) Every year we provide scholarships for Pilgrim Lodge campers. For the next year, we plan to pay for the church's Google advertising campaign. We can't even recall all the items or monetary support we have given to our church over the years! We never ask for any money from the church's budget. All our income is from our fundraising activity.

**In what ways does Women's Fellowship support our broader community?** In the past we donated funds to many and varied philanthropic organizations. Most recently, we supported H. E. A. L., (Health, Education, Ample Nutrition, Love) which is an orphanage in Kenya. <https://healraisingourworld.org> We also encouraged people to knit blue hats for #HATNOTHATE, which works with schools to encourage kindness through creativity. <https://hatnothate.org> We gave away yarn to anyone who requested it, and sent yarn to a church that wanted to start a knitting group for prayer shawls.

Dear wonderful friends,

I know we don't know each other and that, to me, makes your generosity so astounding.

We were in need for the first time in my sixty-five years.

My husband and I have both worked very hard over the years. We thought we were working toward a modest retirement. But, as life goes, we got a few speed bumps that really changed everything.

After working as a florist for forty years I took time away to care for my Dad who suffered from Alzheimer's and terminal cancer. Then my husband was injured at work. He was sent to rehab after having surgery. A year later his job was terminated because he would never be able to work again. That left us in financial turmoil.

Not long after that my husband was diagnosed with Alzheimer's. We were in trouble. 3 years later my Dad passed away at the age of 96.

We sold our home (had to) and were going to build a modest home. Everything was set to start when prices of wood and such skyrocketed. Then COVID came and we were sunk.

We ended up living in an RV with no heat or water. We had a generator and were trying to stay warm in the hope that COVID would end and prices would go down.

We ended up being told to leave the RV. That was eleven days before Christmas. God smiled down and we were able to rent in Sanford.

We have been here about 4 years now. Our nest egg dwindled. My husband got disability but the amount hardly covered the rent.

I was diagnosed with congestive heart failure and needed heart valve surgery. It took a while but I am much better now.

We looked for help and got rental assistance. It surely helped us and was a real lesson in humility! Never did we imagine that we would fall so far.

Our landlord, a nice man, raised our rent. A couple of days later we were told that rent assistance was over. We were in total panic. That panic has not stopped.

We sold things to pay the rent for a couple of months. That is done.

We were at a doctors appointment and my husband's doctor told us about the lend a hand program. That led us to you.

A true miracle. We were days away from eviction. I was at the end of my rope. Then the phone rang and there you were, willing to help 2 complete strangers.

And help us you did! We are still here in a safe place for this month.

There are no words to express to thank you all for your amazing help. Please know how much this means to us. Please believe how thankful we are and how you have helped us. God Bless.



# Ways you can help in our communities...

Greetings,

I'm a coordinator for our two senior volunteer programs at the Opportunity Alliance, Senior Companions and Foster Grandparents.

For more than 30 years, our senior (55+) volunteers have been serving their local communities—Foster Grandparents offering individualized attention to students in their classrooms, Senior Companions supporting their peers in maintaining their independence at home and in the community.

In the process—as participants in this Americorps-sponsored program--our volunteers (who are qualified under federal income guidelines) earn a small non-taxable stipend and mileage reimbursement for their 10-40 hrs/wk served. In this way, they benefit both from a structure (including extensive training and background checks) that supports their sense of purpose and giving, as well as providing funds that help them manage their own living expenses. This stipend also does not count against any benefits a volunteer may receive such as subsidized housing, food stamps, LIHEAP, Social Security, etc.

Based on being an area of high community need, at this time we specifically are trying to make inroads with finding interested and qualified volunteer applicants in Saco.

For this reason, I wanted to try contacting you to see if you might have any ideas for identifying potential candidates for our volunteer programs from within your congregation. I have attached a flyer that can be used to let folks know about this opportunity either at church or to forward via email.

If you do not have printing capabilities, please let me know and I would be happy to send printed flyers to your church!

I would be grateful for any suggestions you may be able to offer. I also am happy to answer any questions you may have.

I appreciate you taking the time to consider whether any members of your extended community might qualify for and be well suited to participation as volunteers in our program.




