
New Friends & Better Friends Sunday, October 1, 11:30 AM

Pastor Scott's Message...



The Pastor's Perspective ...

A couple of weeks ago, I was watching a video about dog training. (Renee and I are working with our dog, Kali, so that she will feel more comfortable and hopefully be less reactive to people and other dogs.) The video addressed various vocalizations that dogs make. They bark, whine, whimper, and sometimes even growl to communicate their feelings. Sometimes, humans do not appreciate their chosen vocalizations and may scold them for doing so. However, what the video points out is that barking, or whining, or growling is the only way that they can communicate. They cannot speak human. Therefore, in order to have a better relationship with our dogs, we need to try to understand what they are trying to say. Scolding them is akin to telling a child to "Be quiet!" when they are trying to say that they are scared or are feeling sick.

Hopefully, you will see that there is an obvious corollary when it comes to human relationships and interaction. Our relationships are not always sunshine and rainbows. There are times when tension and frustration are present. It is very easy to hurt feelings, or to have our feelings hurt when that happens. Just like when we are working with our canine companions, before we jump to "Be quiet!" or "Stop that!" we should pause and take a moment to try to understand what the other individual might be feeling. Are they hurting? Are they scared or anxious? What is going on? Actually, asking 'what is going on?' is one of the best ways to deepen and strengthen relationships. That question shows that we care about one another.

Let me pause and say, "Do not worry. There is not an undercurrent of tension or hurt feelings here at First Parish Church." But I do bring this up because the world around us is constantly changing. Accordingly, our ministries and programs will also change so that we can respond to the needs of our communities. And change is always unsettling. Change always causes uncertainty. Change can also result in some pinches and crunches in the church family.

Our theme for the new program year is: "A Place for Everyone." Every Sunday, I begin our worship services by saying, "No matter who you are, you are welcome here." Earlier today I was watching another video. This one was posted by a young man that was looking for a church that would welcome him and accept him. He was looking for a church that was inclusive rather than exclusive, a church that was loving rather than judgmental. I was about to say, "Come and visit us at First Parish Saco," when he said that he lives in Pasadena. A bit of a commute.

"A Place for Everyone" will ask us to consider not only WHO we welcome, but also HOW we welcome. How to we reach out? How do we invite? And how do we engage with those who do come here? Will those who are searching find a place here in our flock?

It is true that a few feathers may get ruffled along the way. Ruffled feathers can be helpful. Ruffled feathers will hopefully give us pause to examine why a particular person or situation is troubling us. Ruffled feathers can help us grow as individuals and as a church.

The world is full of exciting possibilities! I cannot wait to see what tomorrow brings!

Vice Moderator Update...





The program year has started and we held an All Team Meeting and Pot Luck Supper to put the global 2023-2024 calendar together. We had around 25 show up and had a very productive meeting. Thanks to all.

At the Council meeting in September we will have a few items of importance to go over:

We continue to search for a Moderator.

We NEED A Sexton. Bill Burgess has kindly taken over some of the duties this fall but would choose not to continue into the winter. If you know someone that is looking for this type of work, please let the person know that the position is available. Phil Blood can provide all the details.

We will need assistance removing snow from walkways, both for the tenant and especially for Sunday morning. The driveway and parking areas will continue to be plowed as normal.

Stewardship will be a key topic for the congregation over the next couple of months. Team budgets are being compiled by Amy, our Treasurer, and the Stewardship team. The needs will be presented to the congregation and BASED ON YOUR GIVING, you will be sending the leadership a message on how to manage the finances next year. For 2023 many adjustments were financially made and generous gifts from Women's Fellowship, Meal Ministry Team and the Concerts helped get us through. The use of the rolling fund from Music and Christian Education also helped these teams.

The Facility Team is working with the insurance company to restore damage from the moisture and water that happened over the summer. The team is also working with PM Construction to build a list of renovations that the facility desperately needs. The team will create a 5 year rolling upgrade plan with the help of PM Construction. More to come on this.

Bill Donoghue and Bob Mohlin will make a presentation to the Council to look at the security recommendations from Home Land Security.

The Church Bylaws are presently under review to accurately reflect how we operate the church. They will be presented to Council for feedback and made available to the congregation for those that would like to see recommended changes. Suggested changes include: removal of the Liaison position from each Ministry, some merging of teams, and some financial controls added. These changes will be voted upon by the Church Body at the Annual Meeting.

Another change we've instituted is the addition of the high top tables, mentioned by Pastor Scott in the spring, that Ed Carroll, a relatively new member, suggested, as a way for people to more easily join others during Fellowship Hour. This has been highly successful, as many of you know! In addition, you may see some card tables joined together, to make it more comfortable for people to join with new friends. As Ed suggested, it's often easier to join a larger group, than a table designed for 4.

In closing, I'm pleased to announce that Peggy Warden, a longtime member of First Parish and the choir, will be joining me as a co-chair of the Diaconate. Already, as a Deacon, Peggy has willingly shared her ideas and experience, and we look forward to having her in this leadership position! Please thank Peggy when you see her!

participate in our age level classes. Thank goodness we added another class. Thank you families for being a part of our faith community.









Pastor Parish Relations Team 2023

Sunday, October 8, 2023 is the date for the "Neighbors in Need" special mission offering.

What is the "Neighbors in Need" special mission offering?

Neighbors in Need (NIN) is a special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. One-third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM). Two-thirds of this offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries (JWM) to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants. Neighbors in Need grants are awarded to UCC churches and organizations doing justice work in their communities. These grants fund projects whose work ranges from direct service to community organizing and advocacy to address systemic injustice.

Who participates in Neighbors in Need Special Mission Offering?

Anyone can give a donation by contributing to the Neighbors in Need Special Mission Offering (NIN SMO) either through their congregation's annual collection drive or anytime online at ucc.org/nin.

How is the offering used?

Through this offering we express our deep commitment to reaching out and touching our neighbors with justice and compassion. This allows us to speak prophetically to those in power and to advocate for a society where all people have a voice in decisions that affect their lives. In the spirit of Christ, we will seek to confront evil in the world and to alleviate suffering. We will do this through direct service as well as advocacy.

Where and how are the funds dispersed?

Not only are NIN funds shared with CAIM (Council for American Indian Ministry), they are utilized by staff to develop curated and created social justice resources, i.e. webinars, bible studies, curriculums, advocacy tools, etc. within the program areas of environmental justice, racial justice, LGBTQ justice, economic justice, women's justice, immigration justice, and more. Additionally, a portion of the monies collected are used to fund grants at the following levels and needs:

- •Direct Service (\$1,000 \$3,000) provides funding to meet the immediate needs of an individual or group (i.e. food, clothing, utilities).
- •Advocacy (\$3,001 \$5,000) offers funding to assist communities who wish to change policy on a state or federal level via an advocacy campaign.
- •Grass Top (\$5,001 \$10,000) is a highly competitive tier which seeks to award uniquely innovative programs which can be replicated in other settings.

How much money is raised during the NIN SMO on an annual basis?

On average, this vital offering annually collects around a million dollars with one third going to CAIM (the Council for American Indian Ministry).

What percentage of NIN donations are used directly to fund our commitment to service and mission?

At present, we are pleased to state that nearly 100% of the monies raised from NIN SMO is used to fund our mission projects and programs which include our largest commitments to NIN grants and CAIM.

How are the decisions made to fund various projects and/or programs?

Decisions on which of our much needed programs and projects are based on <u>resolutions</u> that have been passed at our General Synod biennial meeting.

About the Council for American Indian Ministry

The Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM) is the voice for American Indian people in the UCC. CAIM provides Christian ministry and witness to American Indians and to the wider church. Justice issues that affect American Indian life are communicated to the whole UCC by CAIM.

Historically, the forebears of the UCC established churches and worked with Lakota, Dakota, Nakota, Mandan, Hidatsa, Arickara, and Hocak in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin and northern Nebraska. Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribal UCC congregation in Minneapolis, Minnesota. CAIM supports these local churches and their pastors. In addition, CAIM strives to be a resource for more than 1,000 individuals from dozens of other tribes and nations who are members of other UCC congregations and to strengthen their participation in the life of the church.




First Parish Writers Group
