Pastor Scott's Message...

The Pastor's Perspective ...



We enter the month of April with 'Hallelujahs!' still ringing in our hearts and minds. Admittedly, March was not a pleasant month for a number of reasons, but we ended on a high note! A wicked ice storm forced us to cancel worship on Palm Sunday, but Easter Sunday was a glorious day!

As we move into this season, the thoughts of new life stay with me. Those thoughts stir me to consider the ways that we can continue to offer meaningful ministries for our church families and for our community. Hosting the community soup supper to support the Saco and Biddeford food pantries made me think, 'what more can we do?' As you will see elsewhere in this edition of the Messenger, we will be hosting a tea to support the Esther House here in Saco. I love that! What more can we do?

Last month, my wife, Renee, spent two weeks in Ohio assisting her mother who suffered a fall in January and broke her hip. During those two weeks I cooked alone and ate alone, watched television alone. I talked to the dogs as if they might answer me. During those fifteen days, I thought often of those who experience aloneness every day, and then I thought, "What can we do?" We can continue to create community and we do not have to reinvent the wheel. In fact, we can do something that churches have been doing for generations ... after worship luncheons, potluck suppers, etc. So, let us make it happen.

We already have an occasional picnic or supper. Let us make it a regular, more frequent, event. Could we offer three or four after-church luncheons a year? Sure, we can! Can we offer three or four potluck suppers? Sure! Why not?! Can we find other ways that we can gather and create community? Yes! Absolutely!

Are you willing to help out? Would you like to help plan a couple ... or a few ... church luncheons or suppers? Or what about a picnic ... or two?

How about this? At two of my previous churches, we did a fellowship event called "Guess Who's Coming to Dinner". Several people volunteered to be hosts and the others signed up to be guests. The hosts provided beverages and dessert and the guests brought potluck dishes to share. A small team of people assigned the guests to the various hosts, but it was all kept hushhush until the night of the event. The guests knew where they were going. The hosts only knew how many were coming but were surprised every time the doorbell rang. It was a LOT of fun! What do you think? Are you up for it?

I have also been thinking about other opportunities to gather in ways that will enhance our spiritual lives. I am wondering about beach vespers or prayer walks. There are so many beautiful spots where we can gather in God's Creation. I love to worship with the sights and sounds of nature all around. Would you like to be part of a vespers team? If you have any thoughts or ideas, please let me know.

What more can we do? Let's find out!

From the Moderator...



The church appears to be humming with activity (and not in a bad we're infested by bees way). Scott has spotted new faces and put a new members class on the calendar (always a good sign) in case any of these new faces wish to join the congregation.

The Council is working closely with other teams to keep up with the one thing that appears to be constant—change. We are working with the Personnel Team to review job descriptions. Why? We live in a dynamic time where anything that sits for long gets boxed or moved. Through the Personnel Team, we know that to attract the best, we have to update job descriptions (our Sexton position is the first to be redone). Also, when it comes time to review how well folks are doing, having an accurate measure is critical. Council will review updated job descriptions as they become available. Thanks, Phil Blood, for your leadership with this project.

As I said in an earlier communication, our buildings need attention. This will be a critical and challenging project, but it is a task that can't be ignored. We are working with Facilities to identify the most critical repairs (aside from the repairs due to water damage in the basement) to the building. I intend to present you, the congregation, with a complete list of repairs required and the costs at a future meeting. I offer my thanks to John Brockington and the entire Facilities team for their tireless work in prioritizing the work needed. This will not be an easy conversation, and I want to make sure we have explored every avenue when it comes to the repairs and how we can pay for them.

On a more positive note, we hear of great gatherings after the service, successful bean suppahs, and increased attendance at the music events that are appearing more often—a clear sign of how the community loves great music. We are also working with the community more directly (soup fundraiser for local food pantries), and we will continue to be the rain date location for Saco musical events this summer.

We are also working with Pastoral Relations (Geordie Campbell is leading this effort) to ensure that our senior pastor can maintain a high level of involvement without overextending himself.

Finally, I want to speak to you about parking. With our positive growth comes challenges. We have limited parking near the church. Our visitors may not know where to park and may simply drive by if they see a full parking lot on Sunday morning. For those familiar with the area, we have parking at the library and school, both of which are a short walk to the sanctuary. In the spirit of fellowship and health, if you can, please park away and enjoy the short walk. While doing so, contemplate what Scott may offer up during the service and which treats you can now eat after the service with a little less guilt since you parked away...

Message from our Vice Moderator

One of the great challenges of life is reconciling the tension between conditions in our world and the promises of God's Kingdom as expressed in the Bible and demonstrated in the life of Jesus. Like many of you, I come to First Parish on Sunday wanting to leave this tension behind, even temporarily, and find solace in the beauty of the sanctuary and the collective worship.

I am aware that there are differences in how each of us interprets world events, and that these differences often cause us to avoid dialogue in fear of creating anger and division.

I have also learned over time that avoidance of difficult conversations often results in immense grief, when opportunities for new growth and new understandings are lost, irrevocably, as a result.

I would like to share a story with you. About twenty years ago I was employed in a manufacturing plant where part of the business was involved with coating jet engine parts for military aircraft. I was the lead engineer for the production process. The contract was good for the plant and its workers. Good, steady work. One day I was alone in a remote part of the facility where some of these parts were staged for production. I picked one up and marveled at its remarkable technical properties.

As I held this part in my hand, in the quiet and solitude of that place and that moment, there appeared in my mind's eye a small, brown-eyed Palestinian child. It came to me in that moment that some of these very parts, maybe even the one in my hand, may make their way to military aircraft that delivered bombs on Gaza, on this beautiful child looking at me through her beautiful eyes. Suddenly there was more to the picture than "good, steady work". Somehow dots were connected, and the picture broadened.

The current suffering in Gaza weighs heavily on my mind and on my heart. Yes, the conflict is complex and not easily reduced to "sound bites". But the suffering of innocents is impossible to deny. On 13 March, the UN agency for Palestinian refugees (UNRWA) said that more children have been killed in Gaza in recent months than in four years of conflict worldwide.

For this reason I have sent a draft resolution to the Church Council asking for a declaration of support for a ceasefire in Gaza to allow the delivery of humanitarian aid. I do not know how the Council will receive it. For me, that is not the important issue. I know where I stand, and why. However, I also needed to use my voice, and I thank this faith community for hearing me.

We held two new member classes in March and are very excited to be receiving new members into the church on April 7, 2024 during the 10am service.

A new project that we hope to have available to introduce in April will be our "Busy Bags". These bags will be available for parents to borrow for some of our youngest attendees who may have a more difficult time sitting quietly through the service.

The Diaconate will soon be replacing most, if not all, the hearing devices we have available for those who may need assistance during the service. We are also in the process of replacing all of our Communion Elements that are losing their silver plating and are deteriorating with every additional use. We are considering ways in which we might offer options to contribute to these purchases in the form of a special gift to the church or as a memorial gift in honor of a loved one. Details will be forthcoming.

First Parish continues to be a very vibrant church with a diverse congregation and open and welcoming to everyone! We hope that you already are, or will become, an active member and share your talents with all of us!


