## Pastor Scott's Message...



### The Pastor's Perspective ...



This morning I read a journal article about being an effective "hybrid" church in our world today. We all know that we live in a new world with new challenges ... and new opportunities. The author of the article proposed that an effective hybrid church does more than simply slap their worship service on social media and hope that people watch. Being an effective hybrid church involves some of the same principles for being an effective traditional church. One of those principles is engagement. Effective, vital, healthy congregations have always found ways to engage their church families. Our challenge, and our opportunity, is to continue doing that in new and non-traditional ways.

The author distinguishes between being "experts" and "explorers". Experts and explorers approach the world in different ways. And the reality is that in these unprecedented times, there are not many that can claim to be experts. We have not experienced anything like this before. So, he encourages us to be explorers together. Rather than fear the changes, or resist the changes, that are happening in the church around us, we should embrace them!

Explorers recognize that being the engaged church means that we have to think beyond those ministries that happen within the physical structure of the church. We have to seek opportunities to embrace members of the community that may not be able to gather in-person. We have people that join us from South and North Carolina, Texas, Florida, California, New Hampshire, Massachusetts and beyond.

Explorers recognize that being effective and engaged means looking at the ways that we offer worship, Christian education, fellowship, and other programs and ministries, and understanding that we have to adapt. The people to whom we extend our hearts and hands are different than they were two or three years ago. They certainly are very different than they were twenty and thirty years ago.

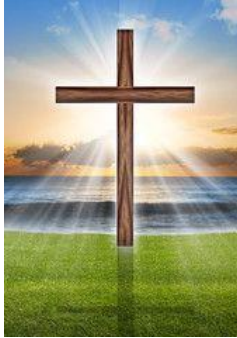
Explorers are excited about the new adventure. Explorers are willing to take risks and step out into unknown territory. And explorers understand that we are experiencing this new day together. Together with one another and together with God.

I thank you for your willingness to participate in our interactive worship services this summer. I thank you for sharing your images of the expressions of God. I also thank you for sharing your Spirit Stories. Some of you shared your experiences in worship and others sent them to me later in the day. Thank you all.

As we begin the month of August, we have more interactive services coming up: "Love Stories," "God Sightings," and "Easter in August!". With the journal article in mind, we will look for ways that everyone can participate in these services. I thank you for being willing to be explorers together.

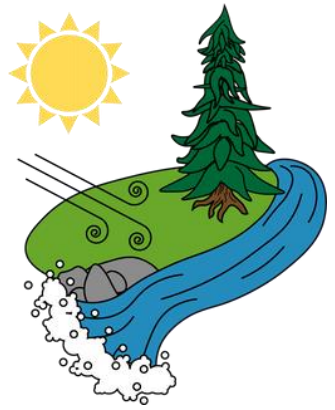

## Moderator Update

### From the Moderator...



The weather has been beautiful lately albeit unusually dry, which has allowed us to get outside more and experience God's wonders. I hope you can take time to slow down and take in the beauty that surrounds us, especially here in Maine. Unfortunately, for many of us it has to be an intentional decision to stop and appreciate what's around us because it truly provides a meaningful and spiritual experience.

At our June Church Council meeting we discussed the issue of face masks. First Parish is fortunate to have several effective protection factors in place such as the bipolar ionization ventilation system and a large volume of space which allows us to spread out a little bit. Therefore, we voted going to mask optional. Please note that this is not a decision that we take lightly. COVID is still in our midst but we feel the protection factors that we are afforded allow us to establish this policy now. We hope you welcome this change which has been long in coming.

Whereas new members may appreciate an improved understanding of how the Church Council operates, I started a series of explaining the function of the Church Council in the June issue. I'd like to continue that here. Again, between meetings of the church body, the Church Council shall be the governing board of this church. In addition to previously mentioned items, the Church Council is responsible for all financial affairs of the church, developing and preparing an annual budget for approval by the church body, and authorizing each year to expend up to 5% of the unrestricted legacies based on the average market value of the three previous years. The Moderator or Vice Moderator signs all purchase orders and standard contract agreements.

The Council also must consider necessary changes to the Bylaws. This is an important issue item that must be done this year for which I will establish an Ad Hoc Team. If participating on this team is of interest to you, please let me know.

My response was, "me?" Then he said, "The question is, what are you going to do about it?" I share this story because last month during worship on July 24<sup>th</sup> we shared Spirit Stories. This one is mine.

Yes! It is a Happy August. The kind we remember pre-covid. Yes! We have a mask optional policy so we can see all those wonderful smiles. Yes! We have a new air filtration system on every level of our church. Yes! We have vaccines to keep us

**Homecoming Sunday** is planned and will happen on **September 11<sup>th</sup>**.

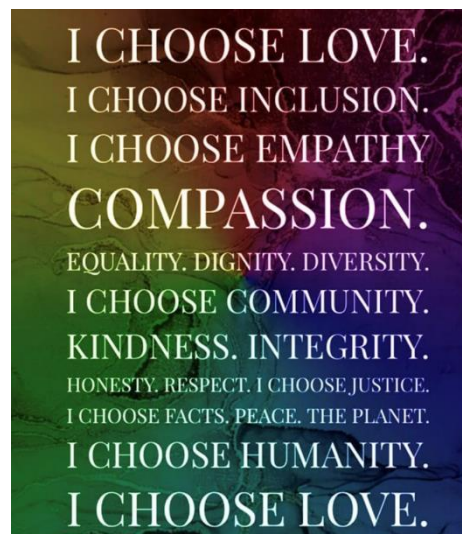
It is never too early to register your child(ren) for Church school. Parents please fill out our Church school registration form. It only takes a minute online. You can find this form on the Church website under Christian Education.

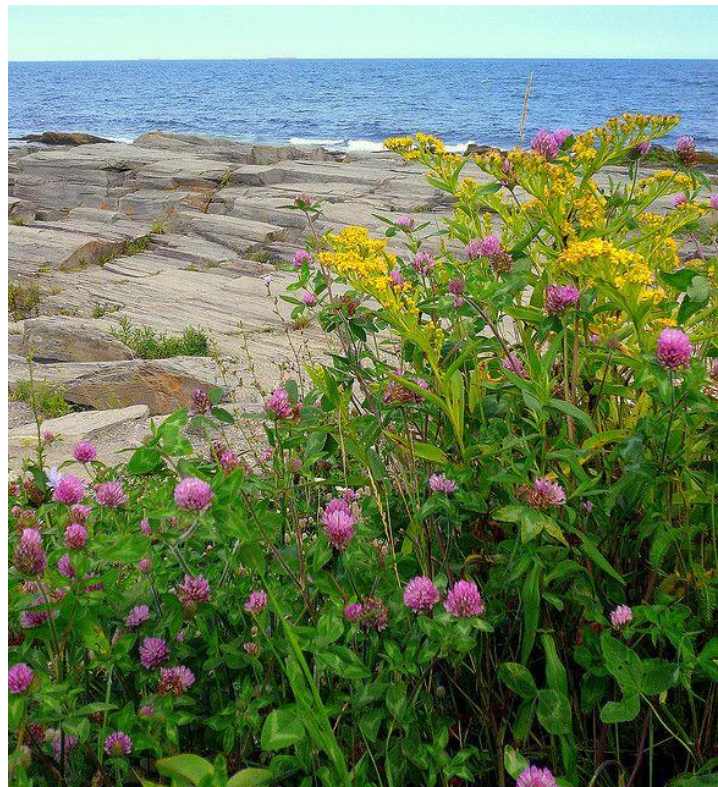

The event not only featured Maine Rep. Rachel Talbot Ross, Tribal Ambassador Maulian Dana, historian Kate Mchmahon, but organizations that help Maine Youth and formerly incarcerated individuals, plus musicians.

# Peace Workshops



On Sunday afternoon, September 18th from 2-4 PM, the first of four quarterly peace workshops will take place. The workshop is free (funded by the Johnson-Atkinson Fund). The title of the series of workshops is Seek Peace and Pursue it (Psalm 34:14)

Using scripture, art, discussion, and reflection, we'll explore what peace means to each one of us and how to practice peace in our daily lives. The work of art we will explore for the first workshop is Edward Hicks' "The Peaceable Kingdom". Also there will be an art-creating time. This is an opportunity to explore art activities like painting, collage, stamping, and printing, with at least one group collaboration. Each participant will choose their own art activity. 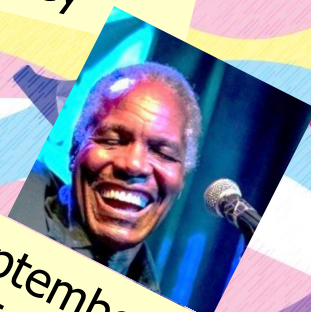
