
Winter Book Retreat Ten Evenings With God, by Ilia Delio

Pastor Scott's Message...

The Pastor's Perspective ...



This past Sunday, I spent the afternoon doing what I do most Sunday afternoons; I watched snippets of worship services from other churches. I typically have the football game on the television muted while I peruse worship on my phone. I know that it may not sound very sacred, but it has been my practice for the last couple of years.

This week, I tuned in to a worship service from one of the churches in which I grew up, and the message made me stop and ponder. (Exactly what a message should do!) The pastor introduced his Advent message considering the Nativity scene from the perspective of one of the animals in the stable ... the cow. He pointed out that there is nothing in any of the Gospel accounts that indicate that there was actually a cow in the stable, but most ... if not all ... of our Nativity sets have a cow in them. He considered the cow looking into the manger, the food trough, and seeing something unexpected there.

I do not know the cognitive level of our bovine friends, but we can be pretty sure that when THE cow, or a cow, steps up to a food trough, they expect to find hay or some other sort of grain or feed there. They do not expect to see a newborn human baby wrapped in a blanket in the spot where their evening dinner is supposed to be.

And here is where the pondering begins ... what do we expect to see when we step to the manger?

Unlike the cow, we probably have some expectations beyond hay or grain. Generations of scripture readings and Christmas pageants tell us that there will be a baby there. Our perception is much deeper than, "Moo. Not food." What do we see when we look into that manger?

Do we see a precious figurine with which we will decorate our homes for a few weeks, and then tuck safely away in the attic until next year?

Do we see a child that embodies the purest expression of love, a love that speaks to a longing deep within our own hearts?

Do we see a challenge to the status quo and to the human appetite for the accumulation of control, influence, and creature comforts?

Do we see someone that will take us by the heart and by the hand and lead us to live lives of radical hospitality and service?

The cow stuck a nose into the manger hoping to find food for its stomach. Do we look into the manger and find food for our souls?

As we travel on this Advent journey together, let us take time to stop and ponder. Let us gaze at the stars and listen for angel songs. Let us look for the Presence of God in the faces and events of our daily lives. And let us look into the manger.

May God's wonderful peace fill you during this Advent season. Scott



Moderator Update

From the Moderator...



Days are getting shorter, it's getting dark before dinner, temperatures are dropping ... must be time to head indoors and hibernate. Many of us are blessed to have an adequate supply of food and warm homes in which to live. Let us be mindful of those who need our assistance, not only during this season of hope, joy, peace and love, but year-round.

Here are the happenings from Church Council. I invited the chairperson from each of the eighteen teams at First Parish to the October Church Council meeting. The purpose was two-fold; to apprise each team chair of activities at the Council level such as building security, the organizational governance structure status, revisit the role of Church Council, By Laws compliance, as well as to receive input from the chairpersons regarding their thoughts and team goals for the future. It was a substantive meeting filled with energy and positive participation. You have heard me reference that the church governance structure that was adopted over ten years ago is not optimized to promote effective communication between the Council and teams. To improve communication, the Organizational Structure Ad Hoc Team determined that all team chairs should attend the Church Council meeting quarterly to replace the Council liaison position that's part of the current governance structure. With your approval, Council meetings with all team chairpersons will start in 2023.

Our Generosity Campaign continues but is winding down. However, if you attended Consecration Sunday, I'm sure you'll agree that it was a wonderful day. It was energizing to see the church filled with activity. Thanks to all those who brought food. Of the 205 pledge cards that were mailed out, 116 pledge cards have been submitted to date for a total of approximately \$225K. We thank you for your kindness and generosity. However, we have a huge budget goal ahead. The total budget requests exceed \$453K. We are only half-way there with only a couple weeks left before we must start making critical decisions regarding what we can do in 2023.

We also encourage you to consider giving, not only in financial terms, but in pledging your time and talent as well, by participating in one or more of the many teams, groups and activities that First Parish has to offer. When we changed the governance structure of how the church functions ten years ago, we changed how people join teams and find fulfillment in volunteering. People are encouraged to join any team consistent with the passion in their hearts for the mission of that team. Please consider joining a team to offer your time and talent. I'm sure you'll find it rewarding.

From the TREASURER

At the Annual Affirmation Meeting held on January 23, we as a church body, approved the 2022 Mission Plan. As you may remember, this budget projected income of \$340,099 and expenses of \$450,960. We were able to approve a budget with an expected shortfall (or loss) of \$110,861 because the checking account Operating balance had grown to \$207,734 as of December 31, 2021. The Operating balance grew to this amount because we have had several years where income exceeded expenses and the surplus or "carryover" grew that Operating balance account.

We now have financial reports through October as of this writing, so let's look at how we are performing against the budget with 10 months of the year passed.

Budgeted income through October stands at \$269,717. This is actually below our targeted income of \$283,416. 2022 Pledges are just below budgeted at \$200,307 through October. Church rentals and loose cash and checks are under budget, which may reflect that our budgeting for those accounts was optimistic.

Budgeted expenses through October stand at \$314,554. This is fortunately also below our targeted expenses of \$375,800. Many teams are being prudent in their spending to accomplish this, using Legacy and rolling funds when possible.

Through October, expenses exceed income by \$44,837. The checking account Operating balance has been reduced to cover this shortfall.

What can we do? If your teams can continue to be good stewards, this will help expenses stay below budget. Please spend rolling or Legacy funds when possible and make prudent purchasing decisions.

If you are behind on pledge payments and are able to catch-up, thank you! We will send out year-to-date pledge statements through November 30th in early December.

Please get your 2023 pledges into the office as soon as possible. We are going to need to make cuts to team budget expense requests for 2023 based upon our projected income for 2023. Pledges are the biggest part of income at First Parish, so please let us know what you intend to give for 2023 to aid 2023 budgeting.

If you have any ideas to help our church finances, please reach out. We will most likely need to explore fundraising activities in 2023 for which we will need the help of each of you.




Diaper Bank Update
