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Pastor's Perspective ...

When you begin a new job, or a new pastorate, they say that the first year is the honeymoon period. This has been a very strange honeymoon. We spent our first seven months together ... and we have been apart ever since! I suppose that is one way of making sure that you do not get sick of me!



This has been an unprecedented year. None of us has ever been through anything even remotely like this. There is no class in Surviving a Global Pandemic in seminary. Churches, and families, and businesses all around the world have tried to find their way through this, and tragically many did not survive. We mourn the millions of people around the globe that have died from COVID. We grieve for families devastated by prolonged illness and after-effects. We grieve the thousands of businesses that had to close their doors for good. We grieve the churches that had to do the same.

In the midst of this global crisis, I am thankful for this congregation, this gathering of the faithful. You did not use this crisis as a reason to withdraw into your shells. You did not allow the fear and uncertainty to prevent you from supporting the ministries of this church. Every time that we put out a call ... you responded. Without fail.

Not only did you keep the lights on with your pledges and contributions, but you also enabled us to serve our community and the world in meaningful ways.

Through the Discretionary Fund we have fed hungry families, bought heating oil, helped get homeless individuals into safe and stable housing, helped others stay in their housing. I am so thankful that I have not had to say to anyone that came to us for assistance this year, "I am sorry, we do not have any funds available."

You gave over \$2000 to support Daisy's Children.

Your donations for the MLK, JR. Day of Service enabled us to serve over sixty people that day ... AND ... send boots to Seeds of Hope, health and hygiene products to the food pantry, and clothing to Esther House women's shelter.

You completely funded phase one of our Audio/visual system replacement so that we can get the live-stream up and running, and also provided a good head start for phase two ... the upgrade of the audio system.

Even more than your financial support, you have supported and encouraged the staff and the membership. Loneliness and isolation are two of the most serious afflictions related to stay-at-home orders. And you have responded by reaching out to one another through calls, cards, and safely distant visits.

Your support for the staff has been greatly appreciated. I know many of my colleagues in ministry have not experienced the support and encouragement that you have offered. We are extremely grateful.

I am very excited about the year ahead. With all of the challenges that we overcame this year gone by, I cannot wait to see what the coming year will bring. I have enjoyed looking at your photos taped to the pews, but I look forward to seeing you faces in person.

We still have some work to be done to get through the next few months, but I am confident that God will see us through. God has blessed us richly, and I thank you for the blessing that you have been to one another and to our community.

Martin Luther King Day of Service January 18, 2021

Our 13th annual MLK Day of Service has come and gone but what a GREAT day it was. In spite of very cold temperatures and covid protocols approximately 60 "clients" came through our doors for services offered. This year was different. We were unable to have any services provided but we had an incredible amount of winter/warm clothing, new underwear and socks and all sorts of health and beauty items. First Parish Shoe Ministry found boots/shoes for 50 pairs of feet. People were as grateful as ever. Everyone understood about why our services were absent this year and they understood why we limited numbers in various areas, why there was one way traffic, why there was no hot breakfast. They understood why we took their temperature and why they had to wear a mask. Yes, it was very different. However, we were able to provide a hot to go lunch. Thank you to Sue Burgess and the food crew. We did all of this with a smile on our faces and a compassionate heart. We had many less volunteers helping out due to covid but the hands were very much appreciated. Thank you everyone for the donations, the set up, the cooking and the organizing. Our sanctuary turned into a clothing outlet with bins of every kind/size.

On Jan 3 we invited people to donate, at our Donation a thon. It did not stop there. We were still getting donations on MLK day. A couple sweet stories. Part way into our day a mother and daughter from Waterboro stop in with a cart full of new donations. They saw our MLK day on our Facebook page and wanted to help. They went shopping that morning and then dropped everything off. Another story consists of an older couple and his sister from Iran who are now



our neighbors, here in Maine. They were all extremely grateful. The man, who speaks limited English wrote us a note in Arabic. At this time we are trying to find someone who

can translate it for us.


