Many tears were shed during the service as we heard powerful and courageous stories and listened to beautiful music. The handprint rainbow embodied our loving embrace. I want to thank everyone that made that day and that service such a meaningful and important moment in the life of our church family.

But ... it needs to be more than a moment. Our commitment to love and embrace needs to be more than a blip on the calendar. We need to continue to live out our commitment throughout the year. There are still people in our communities that are searching for a safe place, looking for a place where they feel welcome. There are still people in our communities that believe that churches are not a safe place for them. As the grumpy character in the video that we created said, "First Parish has been Open and Affirming for years! Everybody knows that!" Yes, everyone that has found their way here has been welcomed and is loved. But what about those who have not heard? What about those who are still searching?

In addition to our new Pride group, the Deacons have spent the last year educating ourselves about racial justice and systemic racism. As we learned we realized that there is so much more to learn! Prejudice, bigotry, racism, homophobia, transphobia ... and all of the other "isms" and "phobias" have deep roots. Many of them have worked their way into our everyday lives and patterns of behavior without us realizing it. We may not ever intend to hurt our neighbors, but there are times that we do through our words, actions, or omissions. If we desire to be a loving community that welcomes all, we need to commit ourselves to the work that is necessary.

One of the gifts that churches can share is the opportunity to connect. Connect to God, connect to the Word and the Way of God, and connect to a community of faithful and loving people. Those are gifts that we have all shared as part of this church family, and they are gifts that we desire to share with everyone.

In the coming months, we will be discussing ways that we can create, strengthen, and deepen our connections. We plan to offer educational opportunities through which we can hear and share our stories. With the glimmer at the end of the COVID tunnel, we can begin to consider providing fellowship opportunities so that we can get to know one another a little bit better. If you have any ideas from previous churches or experiences, please share them with me.



Blankets for Church World Service Just in case you didn't hear.....



Research from the Family Acceptance
Project found more than 50 family
accepting behaviors help protect
LGBTQ children against health risks like
#depression, #suicide, and illegal
substance use AND help to increase
#selfesteem, #health and #wellbeing in
LGBTQ young people.

Family support truly saves lives!

Some helpful behaviors that families can practice include:

- 1. Tell your LGBTQ/gender diverse child that you \times them.
- 2. Support your child's gender
- 3. Talk with your child or foster child about their LGBTQ identity and listen respectfully -- even when you feel uncomfortable or think that being gay or transgender is wrong.
- 4. Welcome your child's LGBTQ friends to your home.
- 5. Use your child's chosen name and the pronoun that matches their gender identity.
- 6. Talk with your religious leaders to help your congregation become supportive of LGBTQ people.
- 7. Find a congregation that welcomes your LGBTQ/gender diverse child and family.

- 8. Require other family members to treat your child with respect.
- 9. Bring your child to LGBTQ groups and events.
- 10. Speak openly about your child's LGBTQ identity.
- 11. Ask your child if--and how--you can help hem tell other people about their LGBTQ identity.
- 12. Tell your LGBTQ/gender diverse child that you will be there for them--even if you don't fully understand.
- 13. Welcome your child's LGBTQ partner to family events and activities.
- 14. Connect your child with LGBTQ adult role models.
- 15. Show affection when your child tells you or when you learn that your child is LGBTQ.
- 16. Express enthusiasm for your child having an LGBTQ/gender diverse partner when they're ready to date.
- 17. Tell your LGBTQ/gender diverse child that you're proud of them.
- 18. Participate in family support groups and activities for families with LGBTQ and gender diverse children to get support for yourself and your family and guidance for supporting your LGBTQ child.

19. Get accurate information and educate yourself about your child's sexual orientation, gender identity, and expression.

20. Stand up for your child when others mistreat them because of their LGBTQ identity or gender expression -- at home, at school, in your congregation and in the community.

21. Believe that your child can be a happy LGBTQ adult--and tell them they will have a good life.




Good News Team

Thank you to all who have provided altar flowers throughout this last year.


