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The Pastor's Perspective ...

My previous church was just a few miles away from Gillette Stadium, the home of the New England Patriots. That proximity meant that I could sometimes stand in the backyard of the parsonage and hear the louder concerts that took place at the stadium. It also meant that I had the opportunity to attend a game or two.



One afternoon, the doorbell of the parsonage rang. I opened the door to find a friend and colleague standing on the porch. He said that he was going to the Patriots' game that evening and wondered if it would be okay if he parked in the driveway. I replied, "I am going to the game as well. Why don't we go together?"

The opponent for the Patriots that evening was the New York Jets. When the appointed time came, my friend arrived at my doorstep decked out head to toe in Jets' regalia! You may have guessed that my friend had a long evening ahead of him. He was heckled all the way as we walked from the parking lot to the stadium. The Patriots trounced the Jets, so my friend was teased throughout the game. (He wanted to leave early, but I refused. He was going to enjoy every minute of the game!) After the game, people hurled insults at him as we walked back to the car. Most of the heckling was good-natured fun, but some got pretty ugly.

My friend knew what he was getting himself into. He picked out his attire for the evening. My guess is that he had a pretty good idea of what he was getting himself into with his love of the Jets being on full display. I knew what he had in store for him as well. I got heckled at one particular game because I wore a knit hat from Peru. It had nothing to do with the Jets, but for some reason the Pats fans took umbrage with that hat!

If only this sort of behavior was limited to sports fans. Sadly, even tragically, people are accosted, assaulted, beaten and abused every day, not because of the jersey that they wear or the hat upon their head, but because of the color of their skin, or their gender identity, or the person for whom they have affection. Racism, sexism, homophobia, transphobia, and many other manifestations of hate and exclusion are running rampant in the world. People are getting attacked as they walk through the park, or down the street, or in their homes simply because of who they are. People are confronted, convicted and condemned by those who assume a superior position with regard to their neighbors. It is wrong, and it has to stop.

"Then God said, 'Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness." (Genesis 1:26) God did NOT say, "Let us make *SOME* of them in our image." Or, "Let us make some of them better than the others." Humankind ... ALL of humankind ... is created in the image and likeness of God.

All of God's beloved children are welcome here and loved here. Even Jets fans.

As you all know, First Parish Church underwent a significant amount of uncertainty and change over the past few years. This church family did an amazing job of overcoming challenges, bringing on an amazing pastor, and reenergizing a dedicated and gifted congregation...and then...COVID. Despite COVID, First Parish thrives.

Our church is made up of an amazing motivated, dedicated, and energized family and this congregation is blessed with countless gifts and talents. We are now in a great position to finally be able to take a step back and do some assessment to make sure our organization and processes are optimized to capitalize on the great work of the church, while ensuring we are all rowing together under one common FPC vision toward a common goal. As such, your council believes that there has never been a better time to assess ourselves as an organization to ensure we can continue to serve and thrive for years to come.

In 2019, the First Parish Church Sustainability Task Force conducted a study and published a report that highlighted a couple of potential focus areas for improvement. In that same year, Lynne Siulinski met with many of the church teams and conducted some SWOT analysis that highlighted the same focus areas. For those not familiar, a church SWOT (strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, threats) analysis helps paint a picture of the environment a church operates in. Examining where our strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats intersect will help us understand our common goals as a church and help us all row together with a shared vision and cohesion of mission.

Your church council is reenergizing these efforts that began in 2019 and we will begin by conducting a SWOT analysis at our April meeting. After this first step, we will provide an update in the next Messenger and seek input from the congregation. The SWOT results will allow us to identify where we can find some efficiencies in vectoring our contagious energy to make our church missions more effective and more sustainable, while remaining aligned in our service to God, the church, and the community.


Each week Pastor Scott secretly tried to surprise the Choir and sneak into the picture, but always someone would shout out, "I see Pastor Scott". It was great fun.

Things are happening at church, too. The Sunday after Easter, we had a wonderful Confirmation Sunday with eight amazing young people confirming their faith and becoming full church members. We were able to actually hold that service in the sanctuary with the confirmands and their families, along with their mentors, all masked and socially distant. You might like to know that a sub-committee of deacons (and some very enthusiastic volunteers) are preparing to establish a diaper bank here at First Parish. Since we are the "church with hope and love to share," we decided it was a natural and important way to minister to our community. Planning is ongoing but we expect to begin soliciting contributions and distributing diapers in the very near future. (First Parish folks are famously generous.) Stay tuned!



There is a place that could be aptly named "Garden of Eden" but in actuality is really "garden of friend": a friend who comprehends the healing, nourishing properties of nature's proximity. It is a place that intersects between heaven and earth, a place that invites thought and introspection. It is a "homing" place to birdlife, wildlife, plant life, quietude ... it is the place I call my "sanctuary."


