The Pastor's Perspective ...

Just as Jesus began the Sermon on the Mount, he said to those gathered there:

"You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead, they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven." (Matthew 5:14-16)

Yes ... you are the world! Of course, we do not generate the light. We are not the source. God is the Source, and we are called by Jesus to reflect God's brilliant light.

This year, we will be offering an Advent Bible study and discussion group. The study, "The Light of the World," will explore the coming of God's pure light in the Christ Child. The discussion series features brief videos created by Rabbi Amy-Jill Levine that will spark our conversations.

As a companion to that discussion series, our theme for our Advent worship services will be "Light." As we light the candles in the Advent wreath, the light in the wreath will grow brighter. As we gather for worship each week, the light which fills our hearts and souls will grow brighter as well. But how do we let that light shine?

There are many ways that we can share the Light. We can love and serve our neighbors. We can offer compassion to those who are lonely or isolated. We can offer welcome to those who may be considered "unwelcome" or "undeserving" by the communities in which they live.

And we can share our light through artistic expression.

During the season of Advent ... and beyond ... I am encouraging you to express your faith, to shine brightly with your light through artistic expression. I would like the sanctuary and atrium to be filled with your "light."

Here is your assignment: consider how you might shine your light through art. Whether it is photography, painting, or illustration, poetry, sculpture, or song create an expression of your faith and share it with your church family.

You do not need to be a professional. This is not a judged competition. This is about letting your light shine. All submissions are welcome and appreciated. I cannot wait to see what you contribute! I cannot wait to see you shine! You are the light of the world!

At our recent Diaconate meetings, we have spent a great deal of time on figuring out how and when to return to pre-pandemic church: how to safely seat and serve people, how to gather for worship and fellowship, how to be available for all the spiritual needs of our congregation. With the sensitive and sensible leadership of Pastor Scott, we have come to realize that this is a process.

As much as we'd like to fling open the doors and invite everyone in, as much as we'd like to throw off the masks and sing our favorite hymns out loud, as much as we'd love to shake hands and embrace each other and chat lovingly over coffee, we are committed to baby steps, remembering the participants in Aesop's fable, "The Tortoise and the Hare," who taught us that "slow and steady wins the race."

Notes from the Neighborhood - October 2021

From the Executive Director

We hope this finds you well and untouched by COVID-19. We certainly never expected to have to switch back to requiring masks this fall after being able to relax somewhat over the summer. But we continue to follow all guidelines and are doing all that we can to keep people safe. Through my connections with York County Emergency Management and the efforts of Roby Fecteau, Biddeford's Emergency Manager, we were able to be strong advocates for having vaccines available in Biddeford and for relaxing the ID requirement (which is no longer needed). Happy to report that everyone that attends Seeds of Hope and wanted to be vaccinated was able to receive one.

I'm happy to report that our first Annual Hero 5K Walk was a success. Like all non-profits, we have had to be creative in seeking ways to maintain our fundraising goals when in-person events are not possible. We had 13 fabulous sponsors and 82 participants from 6 states with ages ranging from 5 to 90. Most of the participants also had sponsors, so we had considerable community support. For this we are deeply grateful and are already working on next year's walk which we hope will be in person and virtual.

One of our exciting initiatives is to expand our collaborations with community services and organizations. Through a partnership with the City of Biddeford and APEX Youth Connections we have been able to share staff and provide additional hours which benefits the staff and those we serve. Collaboration is the best way to meet increasing needs while practicing respectful stewardship of our funds.

Another collaboration with APEX and the Biddeford Police Department Community Liaison has been joint training on Psychological First Aid and Mental Health First Aid. As our neighbors continue to experience challenges from a variety of sources, including ongoing COVID-19 fatigue, it is increasingly important that we are well prepared to respond and provide support.

Because York County continues to fall into the High level of transmission category, we have had to make the hard decision to postpone our Give Thanks - Give Hope Benefit Brunch once again. It is usually the highlight of the year. Not only does it provide significant funding, but it also gives us the opportunity to see many of you and reconnect. We miss this very much! in order to maintain the programs and services we offer, we are holding a Fall Appeal and hope that you might continue your support. By the Numbers

Sometimes we tell the stories of those we serve and sometimes we share the raw numbers of our impact in the community.

In our Support Center we assist 20-30 individuals each month comprising 65-75 interactions for a variety of needs:

- Housing
- Employments
- Government Services MaineCare, SNAP benefits, unemployment, etc.
- Skill Building
- And a variety of referrals for services not provided at Seeds of Hope such as medical, substance abuse treatment and mental health services.

In our meal program we have served over 75,000 meals since the beginning of 2021. These numbers don't include additional services, such as personal care products, clothing, and sleeping bags, tents, and other outdoor gear for those experiencing homelessness.

Program Update

Although we have been blessed with unusually warm days in mid-October we know that cold weather is on the horizon. We are already planning for our 3rd year of offering an Overnight Warming Center. Between December 1st and mid-March, when the weather becomes extreme, 20 degrees or below, we are open from 7 pm to 7 am. We offer warm food and drinks and new this year are Zero Gravity chairs which will make relaxing/sleeping more comfortable than sitting at a table all night. We also partner with the BPD Community Outreach staff person to make referrals to agencies to provide additional support for those living outside. Last year we were open 53 nights, serving 34 unique individuals.
