

This and That!

First of all, I'd like to profusely thank the Top of the Hill Gang, who washed all of the pew backs, racks, and pew card holders recently, saving the Diaconate from performing this annual task. It is a huge task, especially with the added work of removing the pew rack contents.

Church Pews

As I restocked the pew card holders and pew racks, several things came to my attention that I'll share in the way of requests with you, in order to optimize their appearance and usefulness going forward:

- If you use a tissue during worship, please take it with you when you leave, rather than leaving it in the pew, pew rack, or pew card holder.
- If your child enjoys scribbling on some paper/pamphlets in the pew card holder, please take the papers with you, or drop them in the recycling bin at the end of service in the Narthex. The pew card holders are not thoroughly checked each week, and I found numerous pamphlets and Welcome Cards that have scribbles/writing on the back. We'd like the ones found in the holders to be presentable to visitors and guests. Thank you!
- On Communion Sundays, when Deacons distribute Discretionary Fund envelopes on the pew cushions prior to the service, please leave them there if you don't use them that Sunday, where Deacons will pick them up at the conclusion of the service, rather than putting them in an already filled pew card holder.
- Going forward, we have one Diaconate member, who will be restocking the pew card holders on a monthly basis, and ushers who weekly will continue to check the racks for Bulletins, and offering envelopes that have been left there. Hopefully, we won't find any more Christmas and Easter envelopes in the racks in the fall!
- Thanks for your help in this matter! We want to keep the sanctuary clean and welcoming for all!

We had rehearsals via zoom and she posted practice tracks on Google Drive. When we learned a piece, we were to record ourselves while listening to the track, save it and then send it to her. She would then put all the tracks together, often with beautiful photographs and we sounded pretty good, if I do say so myself.

One of the pieces we recorded was "O Love" by Elaine Hagenberg. There is a line that sings "O Love that seeks me through the pain". I had recently had my knee replaced and I had a terrible time with it. I didn't sleep more than a half an hour at a time, couldn't sit longer than an hour and cried a great deal. Non of the pain killers worked, so I'd be awake at 2 in the morning just praying for a little relief. I know many people have gone through this surgery, but I was blindsided by it. So when I would attempt to record that particular part of the song I would break into sobs, have to stop the recording and start all over again. It took many takes before I could get through it, but knowing that Christ was there with me, holding me in my suffering was very powerful.

In college, the director of the St Olaf College said that "music is the conduit of the divine". He would tell us to focus on our Lord and the music would bring us and the listeners into His presence. That song, "O Love", that experience, made that very real to me.


I am grateful to Jacqui and my fellow choir members for bringing us closer to God through music.



The Saco Food Pantry thanks First Parish Congregational Church members for their ongoing generosity. Please continue to donate non-perishable food items and hygiene items and place them in the shopping cart in the Atrium. Thank you!

The Pantry is low on the following supplies: soup, toilet paper, ketchup, mustard and mayonnaise.

The Saco Food Pantry, located at 67 Ocean Park Road, is open Monday to Friday from 9:00 AM to 10:30 AM, and the last Tuesday of the month from 5:00 PM to 6:30 PM.

What is **Welcome In our New Neighbors (WIONN)**? This is a non-profit organization that helps new immigrants and asylum seekers settle into our local communities. Many new arrivals had to flee violent situations and come with nothing. WIONN provides furniture, bedding, dishes, shoes and clothing to the new asylum seekers that reside in Biddeford or Saco. If needed, WIONN also helps people move locally, and directs them to local agencies that may be able to assist them with housing, food, or other needs. The asylum seekers are not able to work for 6 months or more until they are able to receive a work permit and improve their English language. WIONN volunteers meet at Christ Federated Church in Kennebunk, Maine, but their storage area is located in Biddeford. Below is a list of items that are needed by this organization (as recorded in October). Please contact Marylyn Wentworth at marylyn.wentworth@tnsk.org to ascertain if what you plan to donate is still in short supply. If the items are needed, you can either schedule a time to deliver the donations to the storage unit, or arrange to have them picked up. First Parish Concert Series Presents Danny Holt

November 19, 2023 2:00 pm





Called "phenomenal" by the late music critic Alan Rich, and hailed as one of the "local heroes" of the Los Angeles music scene (LAcitybeat.com), pianist **Danny Holt** performs around the globe in concert halls (Carnegie Hall, Walt Disney Concert Hall, Hollywood Bowl), clubs (Joe's Pub, The Blue Whale, Copenhagen Jazzhouse) art galleries (MASS MoCA, Hammer Museum), churches, living rooms, and wherever else he can find a piano and someone to listen. He has performed with the Los Angeles Philharmonic, Blue Man Group, the Bang on a Can All-Stars, the California EAR Unit, and the Calder Quartet, and he has held fellowships at the Bang On a Can Summer Music Institute, the Weill Music Institute at Carnegie Hall, and New England Conservatory's Summer Institute for Contemporary Performance Practice. When he's not performing cutting-edge contemporary music, Holt enjoys curating programs of obscure repertoire from the 18th and 19th centuries, bringing rarely-performed works and the unheard stories of lesser-known composers to audiences. His recorded catalog includes the recent solo album "Piano Music of Mike Garson" and other solo, chamber, and orchestral releases on the Innova Recordings label, pfMENTUM, New World Records, Deutsche Grammophon, and L'st records. Holt holds degrees from California Institute of the Arts, Hampshire College, Smith College, and Interlochen Arts Academy. For more information, please visit: www.dannyholt.net



Danny Holt's program traces the history of the sonatina from the 18th through the 21st centuries, highlighting an eclectic array of composers–many of whom are unknown to even the most ardent classical music fans. Shining a spotlight on lesser-known composers is one of Holt's passions, and this program does exactly that, using the genre of the sonatina as a jumping off point. Most students of classical piano will have memories of studying sonatinas by Clementi and Kuhlau: these works have found an important place in piano pedagogy more than 200 years since they were composed. But one seldom hears these works on the concert stage. Holt's program begins in the Classical era, with short selections by Clementi and Diabelli. Moving into the Romantic style, sonatinas by Heller, Kirchner, and Reger show how composers in the 19th century expanded the conception of what a sonatina could be. Works by Bartók, Karg-Elert, and Saygun give a glimpse of the dramatic contrasts of classical music in the 20th century. And Kapustin's jazzy one-movement sonatina ushers in the 21st century, showing that the sonatina is still alive and well!
